

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1 ELEMENTS • Jeff Chyatte

Howard County Library System, Glenwood Branch

Powder-coated aluminum; 6'x5'4"x5'4"

Fusing math, art, and aesthetics, *Elements* incorporates mathematically significant dimensions that add an intriguing subtlety to its construction. The sculpture combines Euclidean geometry and Platonic ideals with the Golden Ratio, Borromean Rings, and the Fibonacci sequence to create a sculpture that is both visually pleasing and mathematically significant.

2 POPSICLES • Craig Gray

The Arc of Howard County

Stucco, concrete, steel; 6'x6'x12'

Popsicles is a stone carving by sculptor Craig Gray, whose work is often inspired by his studio location in Key West, Florida. Like Gray's other work in this year's ARTsites exhibit, *Slices of Heaven*, this piece creates a sense of tension by placing larger-than-life objects into a whimsical stack.

3 LIGHT CONE • Hanna Jubran

Howard County Public School System

Painted steel; 11'x3'x4'

A light cone is the path that a flash of light, emanating from a single event and traveling in all directions, would take through space-time. This sculpture depicts that path, breaking down the dispersal of white light into the three primary colors.

4 CRESCENT • Steven Durow

Howard County Government, George Howard Building

Cast recycled glass, steel, light; 7'x6'x2'

Inspired by Durow's experiences in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina and participating in the rebuilding of New Orleans, *Crescent* is made as an arc, which in mathematics indicates the movement of a celestial body beyond the horizon. In much the same way, the people of New Orleans slowly rebuilt their lives long after the media and national attention faded over the horizon. Using cast glass elements the work reflects, redirects, and absorbs the sun during the day, giving *Crescent* a dynamic and changing character. At night the work is lit from within, emitting a quiet but powerful presence.

5 RYBEE HOUSE II • Stephen Klema

Howard County Center for the Arts

Stained & painted wood; 5'x10'x5'

Rybee House II is a roofed sculptural bench design incorporating overlapping and interlocking visual interpretations of trees and architectural structures. It moves between the natural and the urban, incorporating a sense of whimsy and fantasy. The bench on one side provides a resting place in nature, while the doorways and corners on the other faces of the structure represent transition and change – paths of entry and emergence into a more urban evocation.

6 YELLOW CLOWN • David Friedheim

AIDA Bistro, Corporate Office Properties Trust

Painted steel; 7'x7'x1'

Yellow Clown is a figurative painted steel sculpture composed of small steel plates welded together to form a large figure. Like *Blue Twist*, included in *ARTsites 2016*, *Yellow Clown* is part of a series of sculptures created as examples of different sculptural metal techniques.

7 SLICES OF HEAVEN • Craig Gray

North Laurel Community Center & Park

Recycled concrete & limestone; 4'x4'x12'

Slices of Heaven is a stone carving by sculptor Craig Gray, whose work is often inspired by his studio location in Key West, Florida. Though the work is made of heavy stone, the stacked orange slices seem to teeter precariously. This work exemplifies his goal to combine imagination and fun.



James & Anne Robinson Nature Center

High-fired clay; each sculpture 6'-7' high

Chatterley's work explores the idea of finding beauty in the malformed and acceptance of the inevitable. He is interested in representing the ever-changing nature of the world, and reconciling the inevitability of decay that is present with every form of life.

9 CELESTIAL TRACE • Glenn Zweygardt

Howard County General Hospital

Verde antique, cast glass, stainless steel, bronze; 7'10"x6'x2' Celestial Trace is sculpted in verde antique, a metamorphic stone from Vermont. This stone is one of Zweygardt's favorites – originally a white stone with a green vein, it underwent a metamorphic transformation to become the dark green stone that makes up the body of the sculpture. The stone body is studded with insets of cast glass to suggest constellations and the brilliance and intrigue of the night sky.

10 BLUE PLANET • Hanna Jubran

Horowitz Visual & Performing Arts Center

Stainless steel; 14'x7'x6'

Blue Planet is a kinetic sculpture. The stainless steel top and blue sphere create a rhythmic motion and balance, representing the movement of the wind, elements and invisible force. This sculpture depicts celestial movement in nature; the circular forms can be interpreted as cosmic space, while the vertical and horizontal lines represent comets, gases, clouds, and heavenly objects.

11 CELEBRATION OF FLIGHT • Carl Billingsley

Columbia Association, Slayton House

Painted aluminum; 1'x5'x11'

Celebration of Flight, like many of Billingsley's sculptures, is a reflection on way-finding, discovery, and the evolution of modern civilization. His work often references history and technological processes; by leaving evidence of the sculpture's creation (with mold lines, chisel marks, or other visual markers), he leaves a physical reminder of the history of the work itself.

12 TWISTED BOTANICAL WAVE • Mary Angers

Howard County Library System, Central Branch

Painted aluminum; 6'x3'6"x6"

Twisted Botanical Wave is an exploration of coordinate space geometry, representing the idea of X, Y, and Z axes in a threedimensional object. The rippling patterns on the surface of the piece also reflect Angers' interest in the scientific formation of waves.





















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
