

1 Pandora's Box • Stephen Klema

Howard County Library System, Glenwood Branch

The first in a series of sculptures exploring the processes of accretion and loss, Pandora's Box examines the opposing forces of confinement and escape, compression and expansion - echoing the constant push and pull from order to chaos and back again.

2 Abundance • Paul Steinkoenig

Gary J. Arthur Community Center

Welded salvaged and recycled steel; 4'x4'x7'

Abundance was initially conceived as the artist observed a sheaf of wheat, but the sculpture's resemblance to a bundle of arrows became increasingly apparent during its creation. The inclusion of a single broken steel shaft invites discussion – is it is a stalk of wheat, a broken arrow, or does it represent something entirely different?

3 Sun to Moon Rotation • Mary Angers

Clarksville Commons

Aluminum and paint: 6'x3'6"x6"

A kinetic work, Sun to Moon Rotation is about the relationship between the sun and the moon and one of the shapes that relationship makes on the sun's rays.

4 Long Walk Home • Charlie Brouwer

James & Anne Robinson Nature Center

Black locust wood: 7'3"x2'11"x9'6"

Part of a series of figurative works featuring house-shaped bodies - Brouwer sometimes refers to them as "home bodies" - Long Walk Home reflects the idea that journeys, whether actual or metaphorical, often begin and end at home.

5 Inner Charge: Bird Tree • Marguerite de Messières & Tsvetomir Navdenov

North Laurel Community Center & Park

White oak, walnut, paint, asphalt, steel; 8'x5'x5'

Carved of local oak and walnut, with oversized joints and a trio of crows, Inner Charge presents a cheerful but watchful community. The tree's brilliant coat of fluorescent paint lends an otherworldly aspect to the piece.

6 Dalliance II • Jeffrey Chyatte

Corporate Office Properties Trust

Brushed aluminum; 5'x9'2"x4'

Dalliance speaks of chance meetings where companions become intertwined with a degree of permanence. The brushed metal patina reflects light, imbuing the energy derived from the liaison, while the sculpture's materials - drawn from the earth - suggest a firm foundation.



Howard County Government, George Howard Building

Aluminum: 6'x2'6"x2'6"

The Single Twist 2 is the resultant shape when trying to answer the mathematical question of what makes a plane start to turn or twist in space when encountering a gravitational pull.

8 Red Bird • Richard Pitts

Howard County Public School System Administration

Powder-coated aluminum; 11'x4'6"x4'6"

Intended to be experienced in the round, Red Bird offers a variety of viewpoints, acting as a kind of way-finder to expand the viewer's thoughts beyond ordinary preoccupations. Pitts hopes to enrich lives by freeing and stimulating the imagination with his sculptures.

Gypsy Passion • Hanna Jubran

Howard County General Hospital

Steel and paint; 5'x4'x3'

Jubran's Gypsy Passion is a tribute to dance. Using abstraction to express the universal concepts of the timeless art form - joy, passion, and celebration of life – the piece incorporates recognizable geometric and organic forms that invite contemplation and slowly reveal the content of the sculpture.

10 Ouill Sail • Bob Turan

Howard Community College

Stainless steel, aluminum, recycled milk can & free weights; 8'x3' Inspired by the great writers of the past, this kinetic work features their tools of the trade: an ink pot and a quill pen that is moved gently by the invisible hand of the wind.

11) Vapor Line • Marguerite de Messières & Tsvetomir Navdenov

Merriweather Park at Symphony Woods

Aluminum, mesh, steel: 4'x40'x4'

Vapor Line consists of thousands of painted aluminum tiles, each with a single asymmetrical bend, attached to netting suspended from trees in Symphony Woods. With each breeze, the tiles shimmer and move, exposing bright panels of color or twisting in unison to almost disappear before filling the space again.

12 lcosahedron • Kirk Seese

Howard County Library System, Central Branch

Steel, MDO board, hardware, black silicone; 7'x2'

Seese's Icosahedron, or twenty-sided shape, celebrates the mathematical beauty of the Platonic Solid Family. It is displayed, almost floating, in a tubular steel octagon frame standing seven feet high. The form itself spins when provoked, adding to the excitement and wonder





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
